

FOREWORD

Two and one half years ago a group of interested citizens launched a project designed to reveal the health and sanitation conditions of a group of people in the Lufkin community. This project was initiated on the hyppothesis that health conditions were bad in sections of the community as shown in "This is Our Town" published by the Negro Chamber of Commerce in 1953 were found to be bad.

A more important discovery during the research was the spirit and interest of all citizens and groups in community welfare. It might be said that while the study revealed a poor state of environmental health in certain sections of the community, it also revealed an excellent state of health in the resources and attitudes of all groups regardless of race, creed, color or business endeavor.

This project "The Mirror" was born of the latter discovery. Whatever sucess it merits is due to the existance in the Lufkin community for wonderful interest in the well being of all citizens.

The names of local people who have contributed to "The Mirror" will not appear here but will on pages throughout this book.

There are a few other people, most of whom do not live here, but who have made direct and indirect contributions to our community programs. The willingness of these persons to share their interest, information and services neccessitates my mentioning them here.

NEGRO CHAMBER of COMMERCE

The Lufkin Negro Chamber of Commerce was organized in April, 1940 by Mr. F. W. Thomas, then principal of the Dunbar High School who became the Chamber's first president. During Mr. Thomas tenure, outstanding Negro lecturers were brought to the Chamber in an effort to encourage better community relationships and improve standards of living in the Negro Community.

In 1946, E. C. Johnson was elected president and served for three years. During his tenure, the Dunbar band came into existence. Through Chamber leadership, funds were raised for the purchase of band instruments with the cooperation of the Lufkin Public Schools Churches and interested organizations and individuals. Facilities at Jones Lake Park were improved also through negotiations with the City of Lufkin and other civic organizations of the city.

From 1949 to 1951, Mr. S. T. Lewis served as president. Under his leadership continued improvements were made as a follow-up of the program under way for the first time Lufkin had Miss Jessie Lee Carrington (her first queen) crowned Miss Texas under the sponsorship of the Negro Chamber.

Dr. S. C. Packer, local physician served as the Chambers president from 1951-1953. Dr. Packer was primarily responsible for the inclusion of Keltys and other out-lying areas bringing members into the organization and the revision of the Chamber constitution and by-laws to meet the needs of the growth of our community.

In 1953, Mr. J. D. Nichols of Keltys Texas was elected president. Mr. Nichols during his tenure has increased the membership, initiated chamber partitipation in the now well known health study, housing and the community yearbook. Mr. Nichols has successfully, secured the cooperation of schools, civic organizations, churches, businesses and industries in promoting improvement projects for the well-being of all concerned.

Angelina County located in the Forest area of Central East Texas was organized in 1846. The county was named for the Angelina River, meaning "Little Angel" in legend of early Franciscan Missionaries.

Angelina County has one of the most diversified sources of income in Texas-forest products and lumbering, manufactoring, diversified crop growing, and live stock rasing.

The 1955 estimated population of Angelina County was 40,500 with a school

population of 8,287 children.

Lufkin with a population of some 18,000 is the county seat. Other centers of note are Diboll, Huntington, Herty, Keltys, and Zavalla.



MOSES S. HOUSTON, Pastor

FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH was organized in 1900 in the old Masonic Hall in the Sherrel Addition by Rev. Andrew Mitchell. It was named Pilgrim Rest Baptist Church. The first members were Rev. George Bowman and family. I. S. Alexander and family, Rev. William Henry, Sr. and family, Rev. Parson Williams, Mr. Will Ingram, Willie Banks, and family, Will Davis and family, E. L. Reece and family, and Rev. George Collins. Rev. Mitchell pastored this church for 11

years.

Pilgrim Rest Baptist Church burned in 1912, and the group worshipped in a tabernacle where the parsonage now sets. Rev. T. M. Rhodes served temporally, Bros. George Craig, Henry Burns, Ben Baxter, E. H. Moore, and Don Benson were added to the church during its early years. The church was rebuilt in 1912, a short while after it burned and it was named "First Baptist Church". Rev. R. H. Holland of Huntsville, Texas became the pastor and remained here until 1925. Rev. Joe James became pastor in 1925 and under his leadership the present First Baptist Church was built. The other pastors who followed in succession were: Rev. T. M. Chambers of Little Rock, Arkansas, Rev. B. R. Riley Of Arkansas, Rev. J. T. Stewart, Rev. Roy Allen, Rev. L. A. Jones, and the present pastor Rev. Moses S. Houston.

Rev. Houston was born in Leonia County, Texas. He received his education at Conroe Normal College, Conroe, Texas and Bishop College, Marshall, Texas. He has served here for 18 months. He came here from Antioch Baptist

Church in Palestine, Texas.

The present deacons are: Bros. Abraham Williams, Lucius Williams, Robert Burns, Levi Richardson, Oliver Lacy, U. S. G. Crough, Julius Shields, J. E. Lindsey and Rufus Porter. The trustees are: Bros. P. H. Parham, Henry Burns, and G. Shepherd. The oldest living member is Bro. Ben Turner. The church plans to erect a new church and set up a scholarship fund.

NEW ZION BAPTIST CHURCH AND CONGREGATION





The New Zion Baptist Church was organized in 1912 by Rev. P. C. Cash. Some of its first members were Austin Johnson, L. Freemon, John Henry, Mrs. Malinda Garrett, Viola Arrant, and Bertha Barrett. The first building was a wooden structure.

Other pastors who succeeded Rev. Cash were: Rev. C. M. Beaman, Rev.

Church Well, Rev. C. A. Parker, Rev. R. T. Harris, Rev. D. A. Parker, Rev. O. C. Turner, Rev. J.J. Fenley, Rev. C. A. Saunders, and Rev. S. J. Venson. The present pastor is rev. U. L. Sanders, who has served here for 30 months. He is a graduate of Butler College, Tyler, Texas and Conroe Normal College. Before he came here he pastored at churches in Tenaha, San Augustine and Nacogdoches, Texas.

The present church building was erected in 1947 under the administration

of Rev. J. J. Fenley.

This church has grown from a membership of less than 50 to about 450. New Zion has membership in the Texas Baptist Convention with headquarters in Dallas, Texas and the National Baptist Convention, Inc. with headquarters in Chicago, Illinois.

New Zion has as its educational objective, Butler College of Tyler,

Texas, a four year accredited college.

The present church officers are: O. A. Thompson, Chair. of Deacons; Inez Tims, Chair. of Finance Comm.; T. M. McGruder, Chair. of Trustees; Viola Tims, Church Clerk.

The church stands out as a bulwark in Christian religion, divinity and

social service.

Shiloh Baptist Church is located on the corner of Highland and Williams back of Brandon Elementary School. It was organized in 1927. The first pastor was Rev. R. S. Bailey. The following pastors followed in this order: Rev. D. W. Taylor, Rev. E. E. Burnett, Rev. V. M. Bailey, Rev. E. Dawson, Rev. Ford, Rev. S. H. Mitchell, and Rev. Sergeant. Mrs. Alice Phillips served as the first church secretary. The first deacons were Bros. A. J. Johnson, Fred Walker, and Jiles Williams. Sister Daily S. Kennedy was the first member.

The church was rebuilt in 1953 when the old structure was sold to the Lu-

fkin Public School System.

There are now six hundred fifty-three members of this church. The present

pastor is Rev. L. N. Neal, who has served faithfully for three years. Rev.
Neal attended Powell Point High School, Kendleton, Texas. He also attended
Wiley College, Marshall, Texas. He has been preaching for twenty-eight years.
He served in Livingston, Navasota, Baytown, and Houston before coming here.

LONG CHAPEL C.M.E. CHURCH AND CONGREGATION



Long Chapel C.M.E. Church was organized in 1892 by Father Mims on the old Square Long property. Some of the founders were: Square Long, Will Roberts, Jacob Robert, John Bruton, Mahalia Long and others.

It was moved from there to several places before being on the present. The present church was built by M. Johnson in 1908.

On August 12, 1948 this building was erected by Rev. B. J. Blount, under the trustees of Long Chapel C.M.E. Church as follows: Eugene Perkins, Percy Simond, Jesse Williams, Clarence Davis, James Hackney, Finis Price, George Mark, Carl Williams, John Stewart, Horace Glenn, L. M. Dukes, and J. V. Penson. Rev. R. A. Carter, was presiding Bishop and Rev. E. G. Allen was presid-

The Goodwill Baptist Church was organized in 1898 by Rev. G. A. Bowman and others. The first site was in the Old Lufkin Land addition.

The second church was built here on this site in 1912. It was torn down and the present church was built here in May 1921.

Bro. and Sis. C. L. Williams, Bro. and Sis. Ralph Holland and a few others were the first members of this church. Of this group only Sister Ida Williams survives.

The first pastor was Rev. Ed Durden; the others who followed him were:
M. Green, Rev. Jimmy Johnson, Rev. James Washington, Rev. T. Boykins, Rev. W.
S. Brent, Rev. James Jordon, Rev. B. H. Roberts, Rev. D. A. Parker, and Rev. C.
L. Brooks.

The present pastor is Rev. A. D. Thomas, who has served faithfully since 1944. Rev. Thomas is a native of Nacogdoches. He studied at Conroe Baptist College and has been preaching for twenty-seven years.

The church has 350 active members and is well organized. It works at all times for the well-being of the community.





Negro citizens in Lufkin endeavor to make their contribution to community life in business as in professional life and labor. The survey made by the high school civics class in 1955 shows that Negroes in Lufkin operate: four barber shops, seventeen beauty shops, two mortuaries, one blacksmith shop, ten cafes, five construction agencies, one cleaning and pressing shop, eight grocery stores, three garages, three hotels, one radio repair shop, two taxi lines, three service stations, one news stand, and two washaterias.

The relative infancy of many of these firms as shown in the Mirror is a glowing tribute to the opportunities and spirit of the Lufkin community.

In 1936 when newsprint production was on the decline in the U.S. Mills consideration was given by industrial leaders and publishers in the South to the feasibility of manufacturing newsprint from Southern pine. Dr. Charles Herty and the late Francis Gawan carried out experimental work over a long period of time which proved that it was possible and practical to make newsprint from Southern pine.

The company was incorporated in 1938 and construction began January 15, 1939. In January 1940 the first newsprint made commercially from Southern pine was produced at this mill.

It became necessary for the company to construct a pulp mill because of the scarcity of chemical pulp. This pulp mill was completed in 1944, and thus make the mill a self-contained project. The increasing world-wide need for newsprint caused the mill to double in size and output.

Today there are 11,000 laborers, semi-skilled, skilled and technical workers on this company's payroll.



Texas Foundries, Inc.



Texas Foundries was organized in 1938 and the first heat was poured on March 17, 1939. The plant was originally laid out for a yearly capacity of 3,000 tons of malleable castings with an employment of approximately 155 people. As of January 1, 1956, Texas Foundries employed a total of 575 people.

Texas Foundries is a "local" industry having 85 share owners of whom 61 reside in Lufkin with an additional 17 in Texas and 7 outside the state.

A wide variety of sizes and types of castings are produced by the Company from its approximately 10,000 patterns. It produces castings for a large number of companies in widely different industries including petroleum, truck and trailer manufacturers, agricultural and railroad.

Our malleable castings vary in weight from 1/10 pound to 475 pounds each, and the average weight is about two pounds.

During 1955 a new Steel Foundry Division was added with building and equipment costing in excess of \$1,250,000.00. The first heat was poured on November 28, 1955.

The capacity of this new Steel Foundry will be 2400 tons per year. Castings produced will weigh from 20 to 500 pounds with an average weight of about





Negro employees. Of this number, 120 colored employees have been with this
Company for more than 5 years, with seven employees having been employed for
more than 20 years, and one has been with Lufkin Foundry for 50 years.

LUFKIN FOUNDRY is proud of its Negro employees. They are good citizens, taking an active part in the Negro Chamber of Commerce, the Negro Division of the Community Chest, and the activities of the Negro Public Schools. They are among the most loyal in support of their churches.

THIS COMPANY was happy to have had a large financial share in the civic program to pave streets in the Negro section of Lufkin, and in the effort to provide better housing facilities for the colored people of Lufkin.





Ernest Lynn Kurth was born at Kurth's Station in Corrigan, just a few miles from Keltys, and Lufkin, the son of J. H. Kurth, Sr. and Hattie Martin Glenn Kurth. The family moved to a farm near Lufkin a few years after Ernest was born.

Mr. J. H. Kurth, Sr. opened a saw mill on May 7, 1887 and S. W. Henderson, Sr. joined him six months later; they named the town that soon sprang up Keltys in honor of the farmer who had originally owned the land. Two years later they were joined by Sam and Eli Weiner.

Ernest L. Kurth, Sr. spent his college days at Southwestern University in Georgetown where he starred on the football teams, sang in the Glee Club and ran campus politics.

He joined the Angelina Lumber Company as bookkeeper in 1907. and was made vice-president and general manager in 1917. Under his guidance the company grew. New buildings were built. More jobs were created and more families made their livelihood from the forests. He still had greater dreams for the trees.

Ernest L. Kurth, Sr. is now the president of the Angelina Lumber Company. This company employs hundreds of persons and has a very large pay roll. The most modern machinery is used by this company and persons all over the U. S. use its products.

Angelina County is the fifth ranking industrial area in Texas largely because of the dream of Ernest Kurth, Sr.

His wife is the former Isla Kinsolving of Corsicana, Texas, she has been a constant inspiration to him.

In 1905 the Lufkin Independent School District was created by the passage of a bill introduced in the legislature by W. B. O'Quin. It was not until then that all students were able to attend schools tuition free at the expense of the public although the Texas constitutions of 1836, 1845, 1861, 1869, and 1876 had made provisions or grants for free public education.

Mr. W. C. Trout, Dr. A. M. Denman, Judge I. D. Clark, and Ben Nerren were among the early Lufkin school board members.

Some of the early superintendents were: A. O. Riall, W. H. Corney, A. F. Armstrong, H. B. Stegall, Mrs. A. F. Armstrong, and Mr. I. A. Coston who served as superintendent for 26 years, from 1917 to 1943. Mr. J. A. Anderson, the present superintendent has served here since 1951 and has constantly worked for newer and better schools.

There are eleven schools in the Lufkin community today. This number includes one Senior High, one Junior-Senior High, one Junior High, and nine elementary schools.

The school family in 1955-56 includes 4,785 students, 187 teachers and 43 persons who serve in administrative and maintenance service capacities. The growth of Lufkin schools is noted by the fact that present figures show an increase of 372 students and 23 teachers since 1953.





THE LUFKIN NATIONAL BANK

The Lufkin National Bank had its beginning on April 25, 1901. It had a capital structure of \$25,000.

The bank began business in the same building which it now occupies, though the building has been enlarged and has undergone extensive remodeling.

The earliest record of a stockholders' meeting is dated January 14 The Lufkin National Bank purchased Abrams' Department Store in 1922 and remodeled its quarters to include this extra space.

In 1938, the bank installed a 15 ton capacity air conditioning equipment;

a larger system is now in use.

Two hundred and fifty shares of stock at \$100 per share was the bank's first issue. Twenty stockholders purchased the shares. The original shares now musty and faded with age are kept at the bank.

Records of 1901 show that E. A. Frost was the first president of the bank. E. J. Mantooth was the first vice-president and R. D. Collins was the first

cashier.

Early directors of Lufkin National bank were S. W. Henderson, president and general manager of Angelina County Lumber Company, Keltys, Texas, E. K. Smith, cashier of State National Bank, Texarkana, Texas D. A. Singleton, Merchant of Lufkin, E. W. Frost, wholesale lumber, Texarkana and St. Louis, G. A. Kelley, former vice-president and general manager of Lufkin Land and Lumber Company. Company, Ben Colling, vice-president of Texarkana National Bank, G. S. Prestiridge of Prestiridge and Buchanan, Lufkin, E. J. Mantooth, vice-president, Lufkin, E. A. Frost, president, Shreveport, and R. D. Collins, cashier.

The first Coca-Cola in bottles was sold in Lufkin in 1909, a total of 8,888 cases was sold that year.

Mr. W. D. Newsom bought the plant in 1911. He employed one man, and that year sold 21,000 cases.

In 1926 Mr. Newsom had on the payroll ll employees and sold 87,000 cases. It was this year that he built the present building on Angelina & Dozier Ave.

When World War II was over, the present building was remodeled and made larger to take care of the growing business, this remodeling was done in the year 1949. We now employ 31 people and sell around 300,000 cases per year.

Through all years Coca-Cola has always been interested in the welfare of the people in its service area. We have always found great joy in giving beyond the profit motive in serving the needs of people. We have always been and shall continue to be proud to make our contribution to the economic, spiritual, educational and social well being of the community.

THE FIRST STATE BANK AND TRUST COMPANY



J. S. Moore organized a teaming business in 1860, twenty-one years later in 1881 J. S. Moore and Sons organized a Rail Road Construction Company through Louisiana, Arkansas, and Texas, and constructed 35,000 miles of rail road which averaged 5 acres of clearing and grubing per mile. The company then owned 200 mules, worked 75 to 200 laborers and built 700 rail road bridges.

In 1908, 27 years later J. S. Moore and Sons organized a rail road and high-way construction business with their 200 mules, built highways through Louisiana, Arkansas, and Texas. They built and hard surfaced 19,522 miles of highway clearing and grubing, averaging 10 acres per mile. They built 1,972 highway bridges.

In 1930, 22 years had passed, J. S. Moore and Sons modernized their road building equipment.

In 1939 this firm was under the management of Moore Brothers Construction Company, the grandsons and sons of J_{\bullet} S. Moore and Sons.

At this time this firm owns the latest modern earth moving equipment and asphalt machines, and can do any kind of construction work.





WILLIAM HERMAN BRANDON

William Herman Brandon, son of Rev.
Nathaniel and Bettie Long Brandon, was born on his father's farm near Aberdeen, Miss. in 1870. He attended the Common school of Monroe County and Aberdeen Academy. Graduate of Howe Normal Institute (now Roger Williams-Howe), Memphis, Tenn., and of Samuel Houston College, Austin Texas. He has been principal of the Montgomery Colored High School, Normangee (High Prairie) Alto Colored High School, where new school buildings were erected during his principalship. During his four years as principal of Huntsville Colored High the school was affiliated by examination of students, with Prairie View State College.

Dunbar High School, during his administration, advanced from six rooms to eleven rooms and as many teachers. The school was classified and affiliated by the State Board of education. He spent sixteen years as principal of Dunbar High School, Lufkin, Texas. He was principal of Dunbar at the time of his death.

Brandon Elementary school was named for or after W. H. Brandon.



EARL TANNER, a faithful Lufkin Foundry and Machine Company employee for 35 years, passed to his reward in May, 1954. Earl was 70 years old at his passing, and was affectionately known by all Lufkin Foundry employees as "Cousin Earl".

Known by almost every driver in Angelina County, Earl drove a big red truck for the Lufkin Foundry. And before he owned a truck, he drove a team of mules hitched to a red wagon. He carried the foundry's mail, picked up the freight at the Railway Express office and Bus Station, and made local deliveries from the Foundry Division to the Machine Shop and other offices around the plant.

Traveling just about 10 miles per hour for nearly 14 years, Earl put more than 90,000 miles on his first truck right here in the city limits of Lufkin.

Earl was faithful to his job and to the Company for which he worked. He was held in high esteem by his fellow employees and the

Trout family.

When "Cousin Earl" died,
E. P. Trout, vice-president
of the Foundry, said, "Earl
was certainly good to my
Dad while he was living.
When Dad got sick, before
we had an elevator put in
the house, Earl was right
there to help dad up and
down the stairs. He could
do it easier and more
gently than any of us, and
Dad always preferred that
Earl be the one to help
him. He was a good friend
to us all, and we shall
miss him."
