Two Diboll players were listed on the first team and two other were named on the second unit in the District 22-A mythical eleven released here last Saturday by conference chairman Jasper Cockrell of Corrigan.

Fullback Don Capps and tackle Robert (Red) Rector were among fifteen players picked by coaches as the 'best in the business' in 22-A. Tackle John Hanrahan and center Glen Smith were placed on the second team, while three Lumberjack regulars were given honorable mention. They were Bill Pate, Leo Clark and Royce Grimes.

The Garrison Bulldogs defeated the first team with five players. They were Buddy Pierce, Bobby Reaneau, Murry Hooper, James Stokes, and Lou Lee. Timpson's Bears had four lads on the team in Billy Bailey, Keith Fletcher, Bob Pike, and Dan Burchman.

Bi-District representative Corrihan had three with Buddy Chisolm, Robert Cockrell, and Larry Buckley. Chisolm was named to the first unit for the first year. He will be back again next year with the 'Dogs'. Hemphill placed guard Joe Melde on the first team and Diboll rounded out with Capps and Rector.

Cushing was the only 22-A team not to place a single man on the first squad.

Cushing put two men on the second unit, so did Diboll and the Garrison squad. Timpson and

Corrihan had one apiece while Hemphill was tops with four of their boys on the number outfit.

Of the seven Diboll players in the balloting, four will graduate next spring. Only end Bill Pate, guard Leo Clark and center Glen Smith will return next year.

Ballots this year were mailed to the conference chairman and coaches were not allowed to vote for his own players.

Reporters found the 19-year-old Miss McKnight a girl with a sense of humor and a mind of her own. She blandly stated that she "had no interest in a movie career" but preferred being a wife and mother. Her favorite colors are pink and blue.

One of Miss America's major assignments will be to introduce the "soap of beautiful women"—new "Pink" Camay for the Procter and Gamble Company. In a meeting held Monday, the seven-man Board of Trustees of the Diboll Independent School District set Saturday, December 15, as election day for a proposed \$100,000 in school bonds.

Speaker for the board, Supt. W. F. Pate said today that the bonds will be used in the construction and furnishing of an elementary school.

In other action the board appointed L. W. Snelson and Mrs. A. R. Weber as assistants.

Meeting with the board at a business session on Monday night, November 26, was George Cooper of Dallas-Rupe and Son, Inc. of Dallas, who explained all of the legal and practical aspects of a bond election. After discussing the matter, the board decided to pass petitions. This was done last week and many more than the required 20 registered voter signatures were listed on these petitions, according to Supt. Pate. The board then set Dec. 15 as the election date at their meeting Monday of this week.

MAINTENANCE UP A majority vote is needed to carry the bond election. If it is carried, property owners in this district can expect to see a 20 per cent increase for bond maintenance listed on their 1957 evaluations. As it now stands, 50c of each \$1.50 worth of school taxes is retained for repayment of bonds. If the election carries, another 30c will be added to this bond maintenance, giving 80c of \$1.50 to bond maintenance.

DOUBLE ELECTION Also, there will be two elections on Dec. 15 instead of the three required by law for the school bond elections. This is possible under Senate Bill 116. This bill provides that two elections shall be held simultaneously and that those voting will be classified in two categories: (1) People with a poll tax receipt and property listed on the school's poll tax roll, and; (2) Those people with poll tax receipts but with no property on the tax roll.

NEW GRADE SCHOOL The \$120,000 bond would be spent to build a new grade school here. Tentatively, a proposed sketch shows such a building to be about the same size as the new high school here. It would incorporate 12 classrooms, an office, a supply room, and a workman room, capable of the handling of 350 students at the present time. The supply room and workroom could later be made into classrooms if necessary. The elementary school handles grades one to six.

Supt. Pate said that proposed plans call for the unit to be constructed at the site of the present group of buildings.

BUILDING OLD Present Diboll elementary school is housed in some of the oldest buildings in town. D. D. Levereaux told The News-Bulletin that he was in charge of construction on one of them in 1904. Part of the Home Economics structure was built in the 1937's as was the present gymnasium. The newest building, a small addition to the lunchroom was constructed in 1941.

NO TAX INCREASE Trustees were anxious to point out that passage of these bonds would not increase the present tax standard of \$1.50 per each hundred dollars. The increase, as mentioned earlier, will come within present rates and raise bond maintenance cost from 50c per \$1.50 to 80c per \$1.50.

This maintenance cost would decrease as evaluations increase. And evaluations probably will increase so long as Diboll continues its forward pace in civic and industrial expansion.

Further explanation on the forthcoming election is expected next week from Supt. Pate.

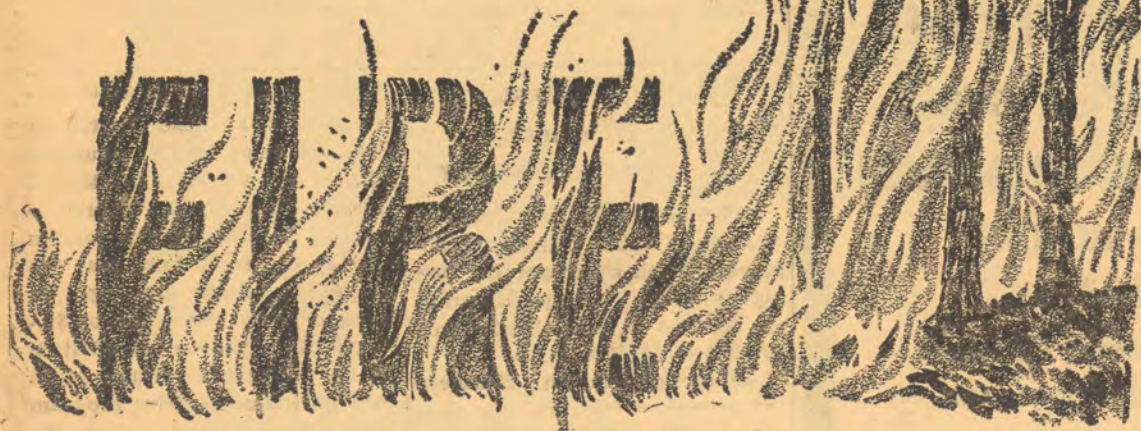

### DATE OF SOCIAL SECURITY CLAIM IMPORTANT FOR FARMERS OVER 65

Every self-employed farm operator past the age of 65 should find out from his social security office whether it would be better for him to file his claim now or wait until after January 1, 1957, says L. R. James, Lufkin district manager for the Social Security Administration.

In brief, according to Mr. James, if the amount of farm income creditable for social security purposes in 1956 is going to be less than was the 1955 amount, filing a claim for benefits now will result in a higher benefit figure than would be true after January 1, 1957, outside of minimum benefit situations where neither year's income is much over \$500.

Such differences could range from 10c to several dollars, and comes about because a claim filed in 1956 may have the benefit computed on the 1955 income plus half of the 1956 income averaged over 18 months. On the other hand, a claim filed in 1957 will take into account the 1955 income and all of the 1956 income averaged over a 24-month period. This latter course would result in a lower average monthly earnings figure when 1956 income is not as large as was the 1955 income. All payments are figured on the basis of average monthly wages or earnings.

Safety Award Winners

Last week, at the National Safety Congress in Chicago, it was my honor to present the Carol Lane Awards for Traffic Safety to the six top winners in behalf of the National Safety Council and Shell Oil Company. Every year, the cash awards go to three individual women and three women's or parents' groups who have made significant contributions to traffic safety.

The top individual award went to Mrs. Violet Lundquist of Anthon, Iowa, who arranged vehicle safety check programs in nine communities of less than 1,000 population and began similar programs in another seven towns. There hasn't been a fatal accident since the car checks were made.

First award in the group classification was won by the Decatur Business and Professional Women's Club, Decatur, Ga. They inaugurated driver training classes in the eleven high schools of DeKalb County.

Mrs. Virginia Linsky, Detroit, Mich., received the second place individual award for her work in getting streets paved around a new school.

The Coahoma County Home Demonstration Council of Chickasaw, Miss., placed second among the groups for a traffic safety program including driver aptitude tests and a county-wide safety contest.

Third place individual award went to Mrs. Joseph W. Ennis, of Smyrna, Del. Thank you very much, traffic safety bills were passed by the state legislature.

The Azalea City Women's Club, of Mobile, Ala., took third place group award for its Vacation Safety project, Call for the Living Contest, and a Slow Down and Live Campaign.

**DROUGHT UPS WELFARE PAYMENTS**

Impact of the drought is reflected in climbing old age payments, says the Department of Public Welfare.

In its annual report the department said it added 533 to the old age rolls during fiscal 1956,

compared to only 90 the year before. Drought, it said, reduced income, not only of oldsters, but of children and relatives who helped support them.

Total old age assistance payments for 1956 were \$111,410,645, parceled out in monthly payments from \$5 to \$55. Average

was \$41.71. Cost is paid 83 per cent from state funds, 67 per cent from federal funds.

**HOSPITAL DIRECTOR RESIGNS**

Dr. James Bethea, executive director of the State Hospital System since 1953, has resigned effective June 1.

Dr. Bethea will be seventy, statutory age for retirement, next October. He said he submitted his resignation early to give the state hospital board plenty of time to pick a successor.

Board members will take up the matter at their next meeting Dec. 10.

**AIR FORCE LOSS**

In the last two years, a total of 1,125 Air Force pilots were killed and 1,600 planes destroyed through accident, according to Brig. Gen. Joseph D. Caldara, director of flight safety research.

Even so, the accident rate of the Air Force has been cut from 503 per 100,000 flying hours in 1931 to 15 per 100,000 flying hours today.

**TRADING STAMPS**

The current trading stamp "fever" has spread to all states except Utah, Kansas and North Dakota — which have passed measures limiting their use.

More than 400 trading stamp companies are now operating, doing \$600,000,000 a year business, according to the Department of Commerce.

Washington, D. C. — Police are looking for the vandals who punched or slashed ten tires on eight police cars parked in the Police Department's municipal center garage. Six of the cars were police cruisers and the other two were owned by police inspectors.

**Mexican Dentist Sinks Teeth in New Poultry Development**



MONTERREY, MEXICO—There's a revolution going on in Mexico and strange as it may seem, it's in poultry and not politics. Yes, Mexican poultry raising is taking on a new look largely through the efforts of one man—a practicing dentist in Monterrey.

Dr. Gonzalo Gonzalez started caged poultry production as a hobby several years ago, and now, his new venture has expanded into a mammoth business of its own. In cage operations, each hen is kept in her own cage and remains there only as long as she pays a profit. When a layer's egg production drops below 50%, she is removed and sold for meat. Since starting his poultry program, Dr. Gonzalez has supervised the purchase and management of over 150,000 DeKalb Chix. The Doctor hopes to triple this number in the next three years. Shown above are several typical cage buildings of the latest type near Monterrey which house up to 15,000 birds.

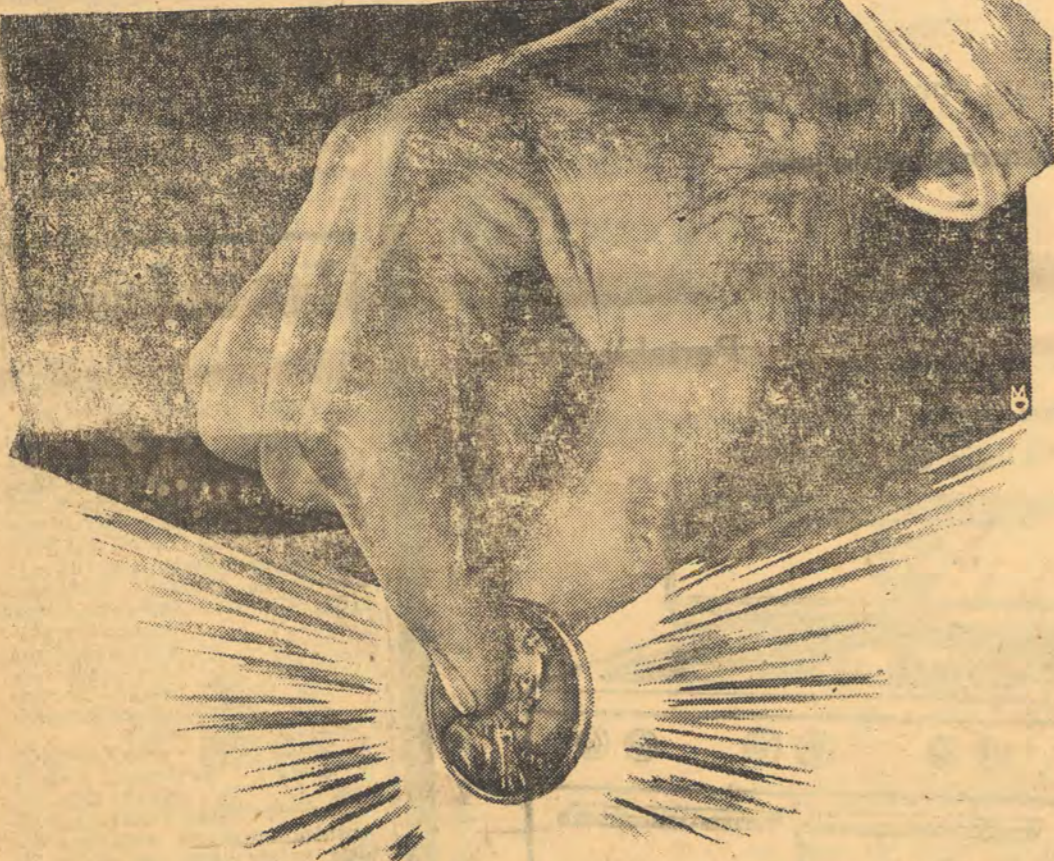

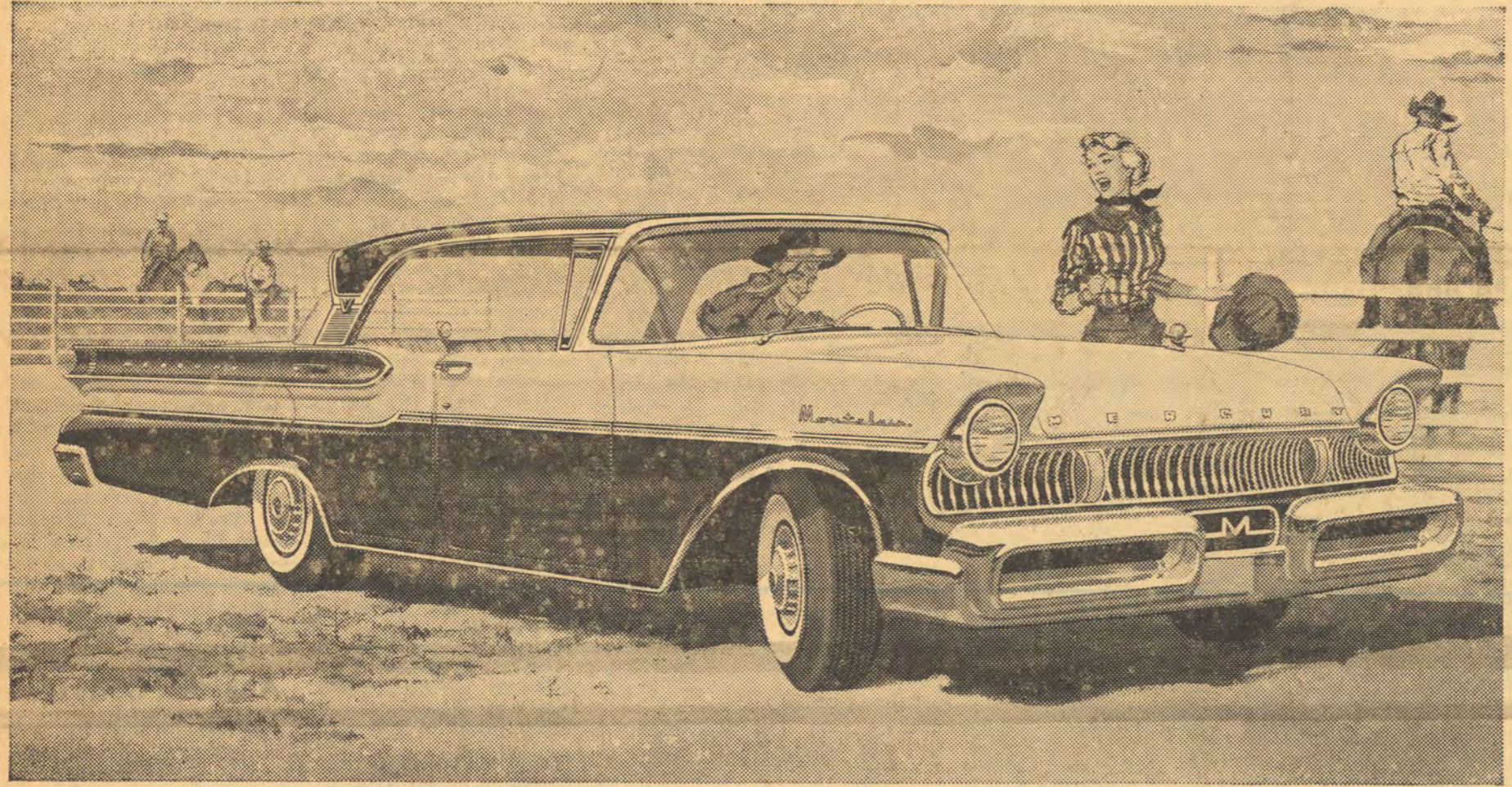

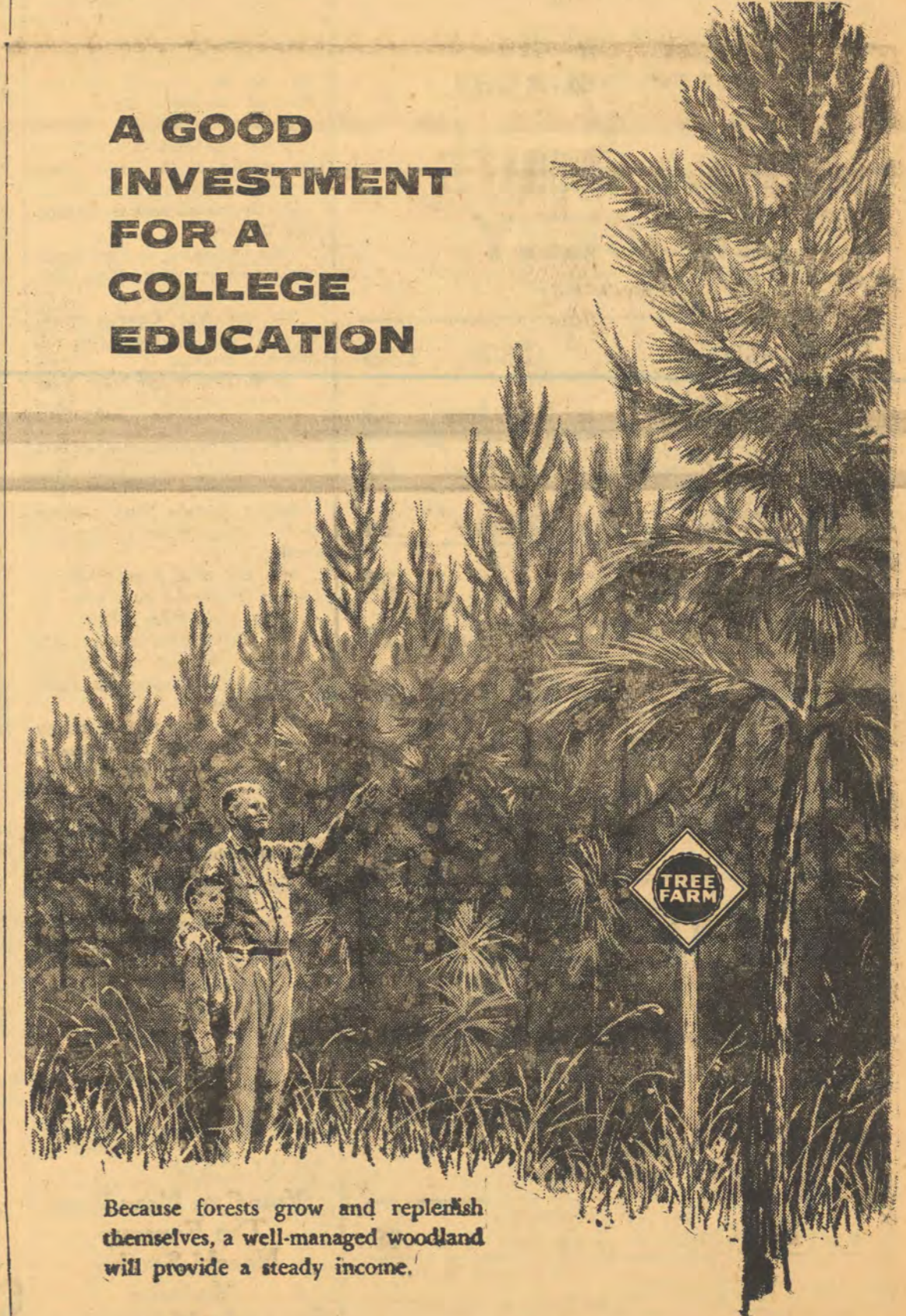
