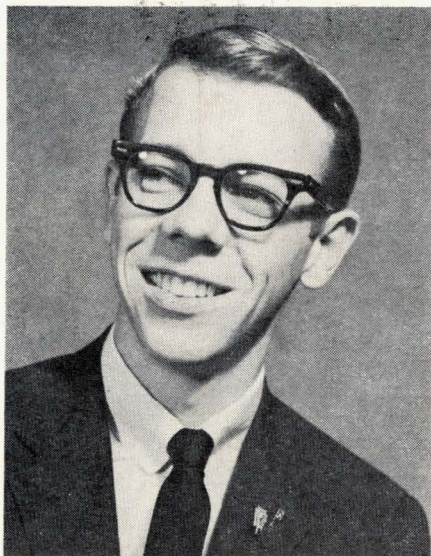

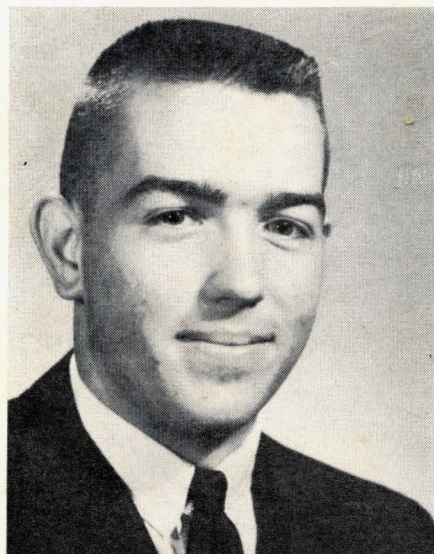

SCHOLARSHIP WINNERS Announced

The first winners of the Lufkin Foundry and Machine Company Charitable and Educational Foundation scholarships for the 1964-65 school year are: Michael Dwain Beck, Sharon Lee Holt, Mary Susan Lang, and John Edward Short.

These four scholarships are the first to be awarded by the Foundation. Some 28 children of Lufkin Foundry employees throughout Angelina County applied for the scholarships. Children of officers of the Company were not eligible to apply.

Winners were selected by a committee composed of outstanding citizens of the County who have long exhibited an interest in education. No officer or employee of Lufkin Foundry and Machine Company is a member of the committee, nor is the County School superintendent a member of the committee.

The purpose of these scholarships is to express an interest in the families of Lufkin Foundry employees and to help create greater interest in higher education, according to W. W. Trout, president of Lufkin Foundry and Machine Company.

Each scholarship is valued at \$2000 with \$500 being paid to the winner's college each year for four years.

Upon making the announcement, Mr. Trout said, "I congratulate the winners

of the four scholarships. The Foundation hopes that their years of seeking a higher education will be made a little easier by the scholarships they have won through their efforts and activities during their high school years."

He also added, "The Foundation regrets that each applicant could not be granted a scholarship. The competition was keen and we are proud of the scholastic records of each applicant."

This year's winners are four young people with an eye on their future. Mike Beck is the 18-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Beck. His father is employed in the Machine Shop. Mike plans to attend Stephen F. Austin State College in Nacogdoches this fall where he plans to have a pre-dental major. His minor subject will be either Biology or Chemistry. Mike's ultimate goal is to enter the University of Texas Dental Branch in Houston and receive his D.D.S. degree.

Sharon Holt also plans to attend Stephen F. Austin this fall. Eighteen-year-old Sharon is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Burval Holt. Burval is employed in the Electrical Department. Sharon will major in Elementary Education with a minor in Home Economics.

Susan Lang is the 17-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Lang. Her father is Foundry Superintendent. Susan plans to enter Texas Tech this fall, but has not decided about a major and minor field.

John Short is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John V. Short. His father is employed in the Trailer Division. John, who is 17 years old will attend A & M University this fall where he plans to major in design and minor in military science. This summer John is employed in the drafting department of the Trailer Division.

United Interscholastic League Contests for piano. She has won all first place awards in these contests since the eighth grade and this year she will play her piano solo, "Bach-Three-Part Invention," in the state contest.

In the annual audition sponsored by the National Federation of Student Musicians she played several numbers last year and was given one of the highest ratings that a student can receive.

She has been a Girl Scout since the second grade. This July her troop plans a two-week trip to Washington, D. C., New York, and Canada. She and her fellow Scouts have worked hard to raise the money for this trip and they are very excited about it.

In school, Julia Ann is an all "A" student and a member of the National Honor Society. She is also a member of the French Club and a past member of the high school Dramatics Club. She finds French interesting, but one of her big challenges is math. She has always been a top math student and was enrolled in an advanced math class this past school year. for. She studies many nights until 12 o'clock, but she feels that this is important because she plans to go to college.

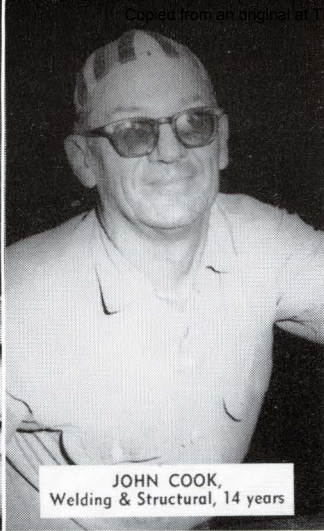

CREDIT UNION NEWS

AFTER nine months of operation, LFM Federal Credit Union is continuing to grow. It now boasts 433 members and since its beginning has made 155 loans totaling \$35,556.72. These loans have benefited members in many ways—consolidation of bills, wedding expenses, funeral expenses, college tuition, furniture financing, auto financing, payment of taxes, etc.

One of the purposes of a Credit Union is to encourage thrift through systematic saving. While there are several members making regular deposits, there are far too many accounts inactive. Your Credit Union Board has come up with the following program to change this.

To encourage systematic saving an account number will be drawn each month by the Board of Directors. The account bearing this number will be credited with one \$5.00 share provided that member has made one or more deposits totaling \$5.00 or more during the last preceding month, and provided that member's account balance at the end of the month is greater by \$5.00 or more than it was at the beginning of the month.

In the event the member whose number is drawn has not made the necessary deposit or deposits to qualify, the \$5.00 share will be carried over to the following month. This "jack pot" will build up at the rate of \$5.00 per month until a qualified winner is drawn. At that time the procedure will start over again with one \$5.00 share. Officers, Directors, members of the Credit Committee and the Supervisory Committee will not be eligible.

This "jack pot" was started for the month of April with the first drawing being made at the Directors Meeting May 4, 1965. The person whose number was drawn did not qualify and therefore, the "pot" was sweetened for the Month of May. When this article went to press, the drawing for May had not been made.

Somebody is going to be a winner. Be sure you are eligible by depositing at least \$5.00 each month.

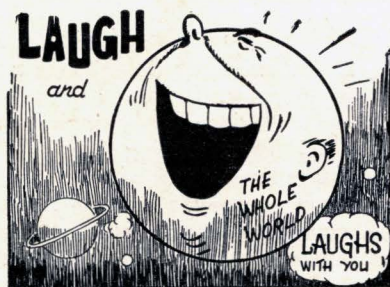
The Foundry Roundup
