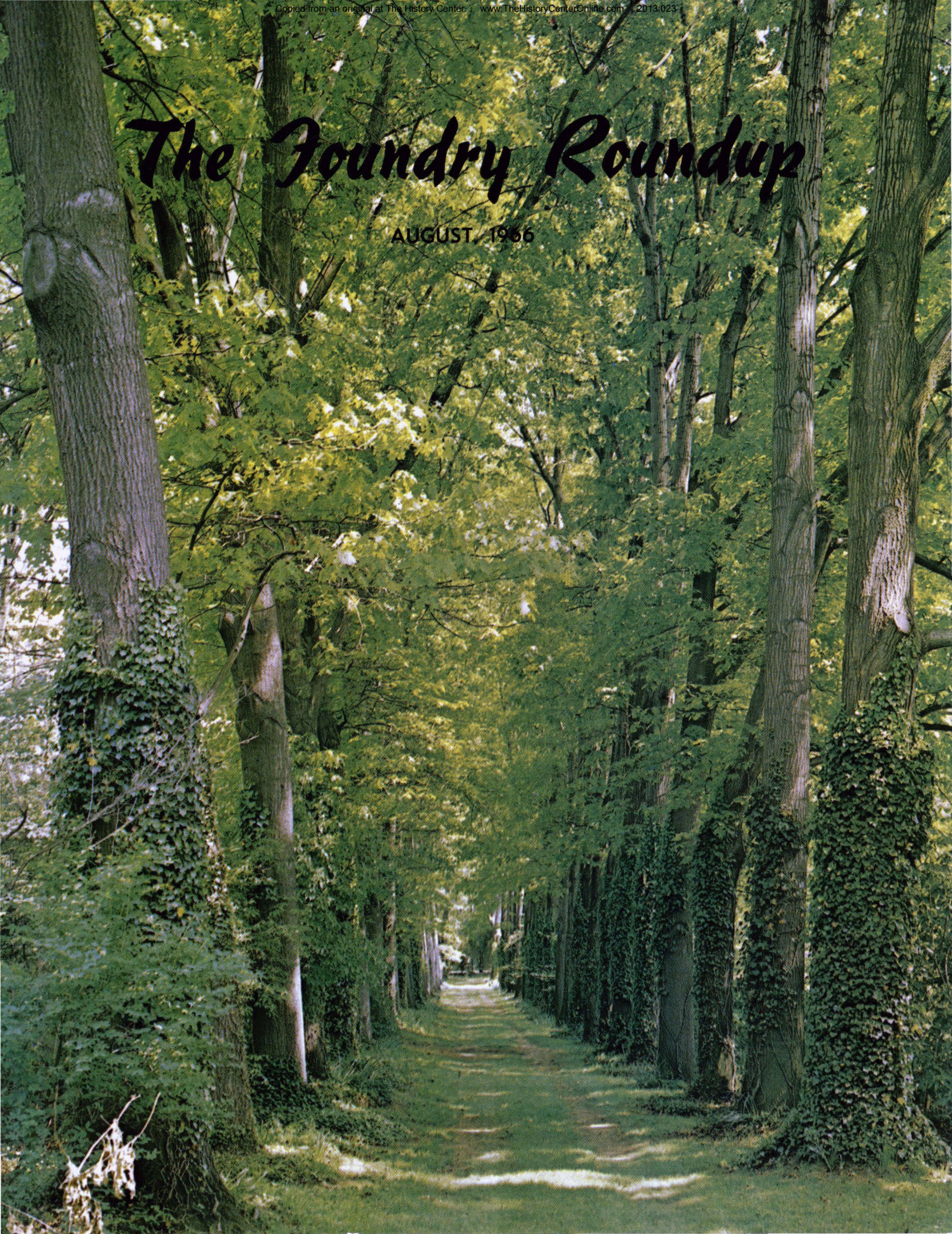

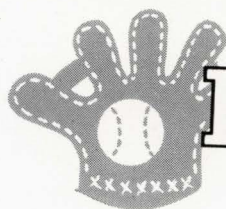
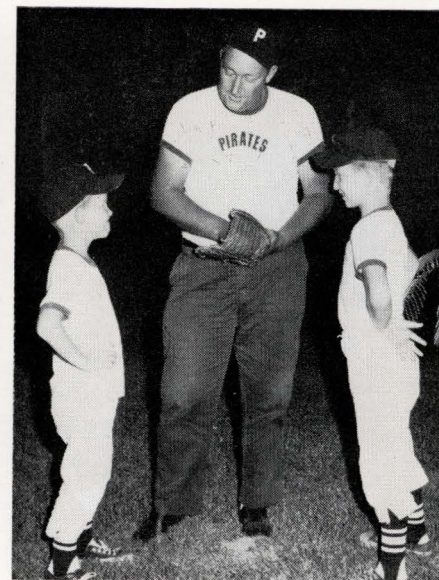

BASEBALL and the BRIDGES

BASEBALL is the main topic of discussion in the John Bridges' household. The entire family, which consists of John, his wife, Kathryn; Johnnie, 9; Dennis Wayne, 7; Randy, 5; and Kathy and Patty, 2-year old twins; are avid baseball fans.

Johnnie and Dennis Wayne are the baseball players in the Bridges' family. Johnnie, who will be a fourth grade student at Herty Elementary School, is a member of the East Side Farm League Pirates. He has been playing baseball for three years. Johnnie played second base with the Pirates this year. Also, this year, he was selected as a member of the Farm League All Stars Team Number 1. Each All Stars team is made up of four boys from each Farm League team. Johnnie played the third base position with the All Stars.

Last year Johnnie had a stroke of bad luck that interrupted his baseball career for eight weeks. He broke his leg while playing a game and missed half of the season. His teammates made him an honorary All Star team member at the end of the season.

A second-grade student at Herty Elementary School, Dennis Wayne was the first seven-year old to make the All Stars team this year. He is also a member of the East Side Farm League Pirates baseball team, for which he has played only a year. With the Pirates, he played the first and second base positions and also pitched. Dennis Wayne was the second baseman on the All Stars team.

John, who is employed as a truck driver in the Trailer Division, is the third member of the family to actively participate in some phase of baseball. John managed the Pirates for the first time this year. Last year he was the assistant manager.

John feels very strongly about his work with the young boys who range from seven to nine years of age. He gives his reason for taking the managerial position as to "not only help my sons, but someone else's son." He feels that if he "can be responsible for keeping one boy out of trouble or make a good citizen of him" then he would have done what he "set out to do."

Young Randy Bridges watches his older brothers with great longing for the day when he can put on the baseball uniform and join them. Randy helped as a bat boy for the Pirates this year, a job which Dennis Wayne had before he was eligible to play.

The really bright spots in the Bridges' household come in the form of two bouncing little twin girls, Kathy and Patty. Although they appear identical to the person seeing them for the first time, Kathryn Bridges says that they are not identical. The three boys, as well as their mother and father, always have a spare moment to make the twins smile.

The chief cook and homemaker is Kathryn Bridges who finds that she can't complain about having too much spare time. But she somehow has time to take an active interest in the baseball that the

John and Kathryn see that the boys have special chores around the house. They clean their rooms and help with the dishes. One of the most helpful things that Johnnie and Dennis Wayne do is to iron their baseball pants. "If a child doesn't have a responsibility now, then they won't when they grow up," Kathryn says.

The Bridges' are a happy, close-knit family. They love going places together and doing things together. Every summer before the twins were born they went camping on some river for a week, and they think now that the girls are old enough to enjoy it. They also enjoy fishing and swimming. On July 3, John took the family to the Astrodome to see a baseball game. While they were there, they visited the zoo in Houston.

Another big event for Kathryn and the children this summer was their trip to Minnesota on August 5. They went with Kathryn's mother, Mrs. Effie Kaemmerling, to Mrs. Kaemmerling's lake cabin located on upper South Long Lake at Brainard, Minnesota. They returned to Lufkin on August 20.

John is a large man who shows great pride in his

family. His boys show great admiration for him, and his lap is instantly filled with the twins the minute he relaxes in a chair. Employed at Lufkin Foundry for three years, John likes to hunt when he can find the time. His family shares his enthusiasm for the future. They are buying three acres of land just outside of town where they hope to build their "dream home" someday. In the meantime, there is a house at 2501 Paul which is bursting with the activity of seven very happy people.

grandchildren are Allan Teer, and Scott, Jan, and Leslie McDaniels.

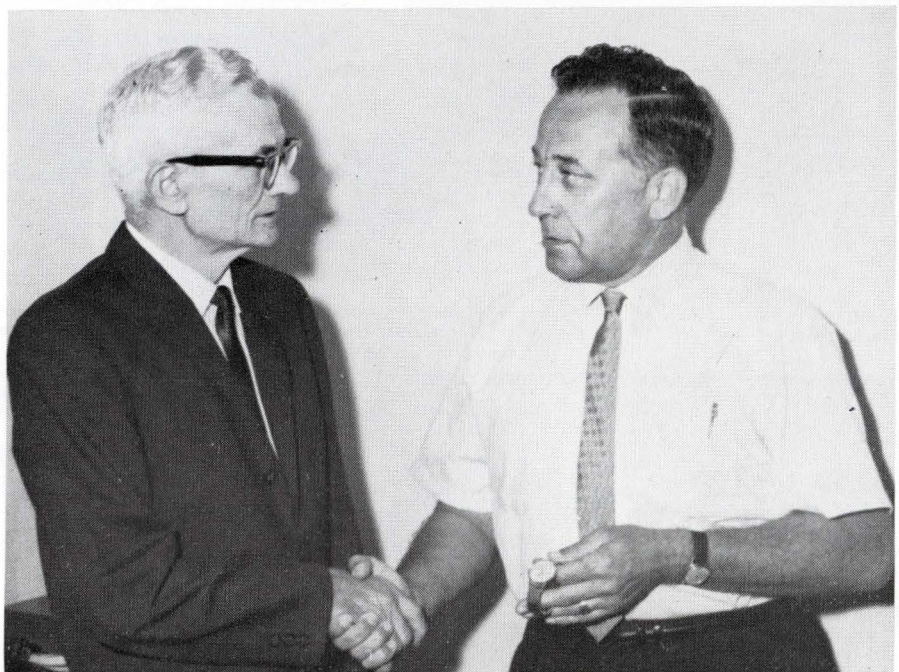

Congratulations to Mr. and Mrs. RONNIE STRINGER who have a new baby at their house. Ronnie works the second shift in the Machine Shop.

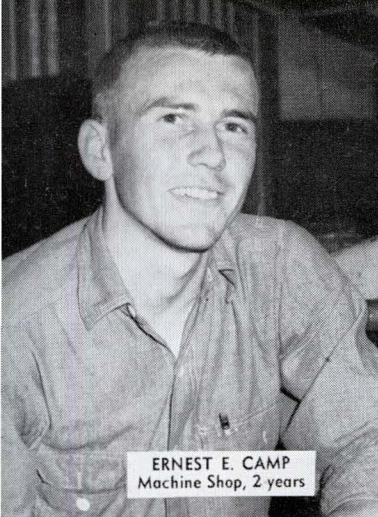

Our deep sympathy to WAYNE DEBEHNKE and his family on the death of Wayne's father. Wayne works in the Metallurgy Lab., first shift.

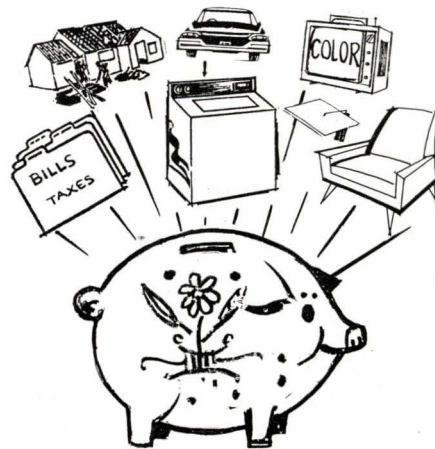
