# Industrial Education GRADUATES HONORED

My scrapbook shows that the Third Annual banquet for colored employees was held December 31, 1938. The hosts and guests were: W. C. Trout, president; A. E. Percy, W. D. Winston, E. M. Tollefson, A. E. Cudlipp, M. L. Wilkinson, Guy Croom, W. W. Trout, H. M. Douglass, Coach C. L. Franklin and W. H. Brandon, principal. I noted that Mr. Wilkinson and Mr. Cudlipp were not in attendance and that T. L. Hays name was added.

I also noted that both colored men made good talks. One spoke on crime being born of ignorance. On the first page of the invitation was "My Daily Creed" which stated: "I am a progressive foundryman living in a progressive town, trying to pull my fellowman up and not down."

The program went as follows: Chanted Blessing by the First Baptist choir; Welcome Address by Perlie Mae Johnson; A chorus by The First Baptist choir; A trio by Mesdames Edna Carter, Bennie Claybon and Tressie Burns; A solo by Miss Claudie Collins; and the address by W. C. Trout.

The menu consisted of tomato juice cocktail, holiday salad, Christmas turkey, celery stuffing, apple slices, brown gravy, buttered onions, savory mashed potatoes, peas, carrots, Parker House rolls, mince meat pie, and a demi tasse.
