# Foundry SCHOLARSHIP WINNERS Announced...

THE Lufkin Foundry and Machine Company Charitable and Educational Foundation scholarships for the 1966-67 school year were awarded to: Lynda Wimp, Judy Landrum, David Bowers, and Bill Willmon.

The scholarships were presented by C. J. (Dude) Schuller, vice president, at the annual Awards Day ceremonies at Lufkin High school, and at an assembly at Hudson High school.

Each scholarship is valued at \$2000 with \$500 being paid each year for four years to the winner's college. Children of officers of the company are not eligible to win these scholarships, according to W. W. Trout, chairman of the board and chief executive officer of Lufkin Foundry and Machine Company.

The scholarships were awarded on the basis of scholarship, citizenship and character. Winners were selected by a committee composed of persons who have exhibited an active interest in education throughout the years. No officer or employee of Lufkin Foundry is a member of this committee, and

committee members are known only to the trustees of the Foundation, Mr. Trout pointed out.

"We congratulate the winners of the four scholarships," the Board Chairman said, "and we are proud of their scholastic achievements and many commendable activities during their four years in high school. Our purpose in giving these scholarships is to reward the students for their efforts and to express our interest in the families of Lufkin Foundry employees. We also want to create greater interest in higher education."

Vice President Schuller expressed the pleasure of the trustees of the Foundation in awarding these scholarships.

"We also regret that we could not award such a scholarship to each child who made application for it. All were worthy competitors and we are proud of the achievements of all children of our employees," he said.

The winners of this year's scholarships are four young people with an eye on the future. Lynda Wimp is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wayne
