We in America respect ownership of Private Property to the extent that we risk our lives, our fortunes and our sacred honor to insure that it is in the possession of its rightful owner.

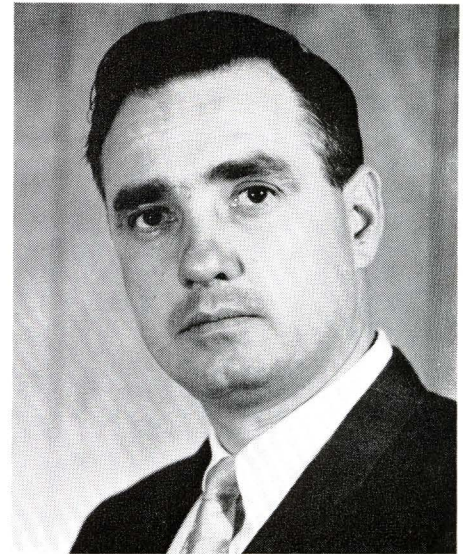
In the face of growing socialism and communistic trends, we must continue to defend the rights of individuals to own property, and enjoy the fruits of their labor for their personal benefit.

It was announced that E. P. Trout and L. A. Little will retire from active management on June 1.

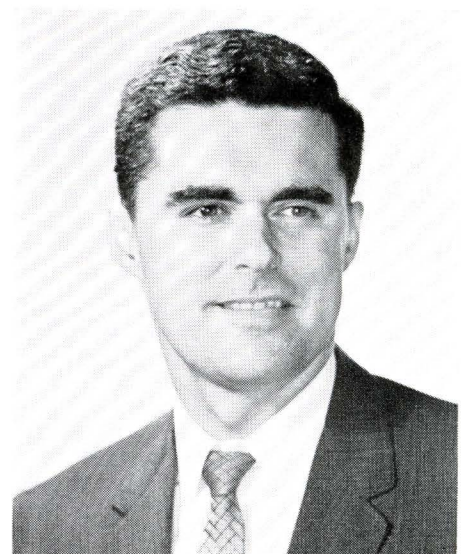
However, all three men will remain in an advisory capacity until the end of the year, having offices away from the main administration building but near enough for consultation.

ment, lost his son, George, in battle action last September.

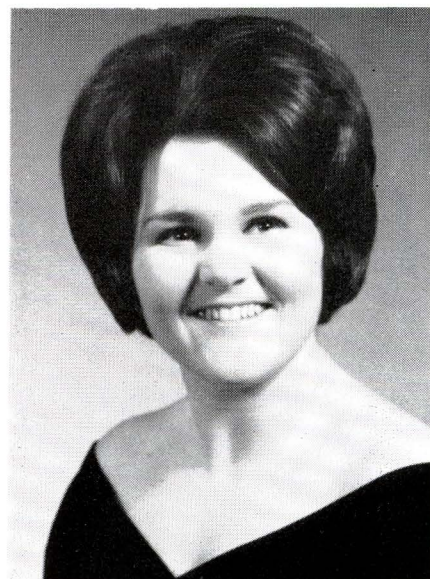

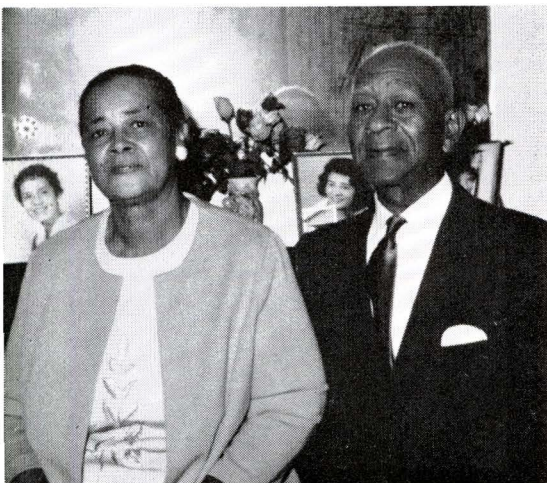
"We had some bad luck with the first house we built; it burned. But fortunately, we had it covered by insurance, and it wasn't a total loss," Jimmy said.

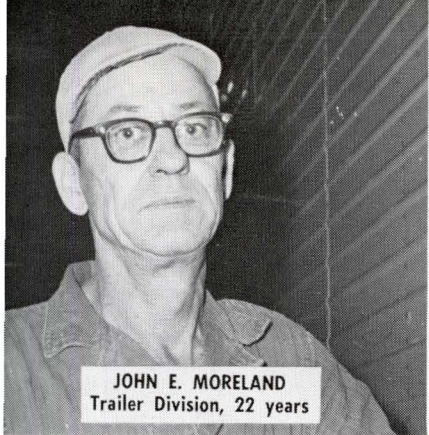

"The kids and my wife get as excited on Sunday afternoons as I do," he said with a smile.

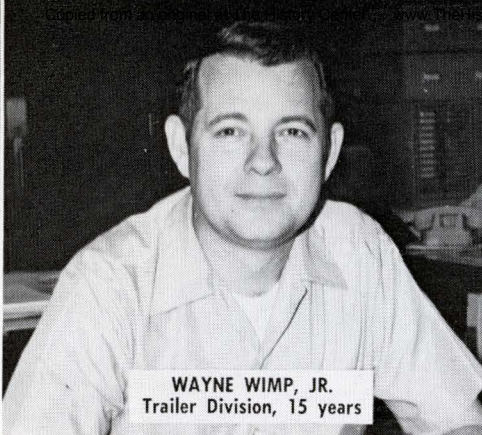
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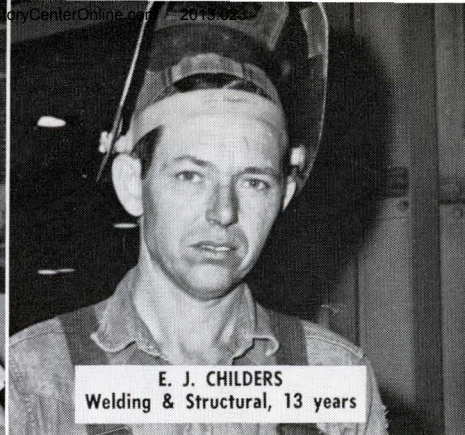

Congratulations to JAMES MEWBOURN, Engineering, who was elected State Director of the Texas JayCees at the Area 5 convention held in Longview March 16-17.

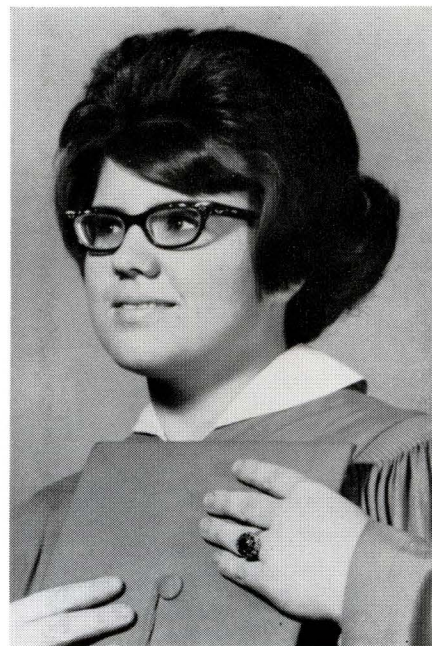

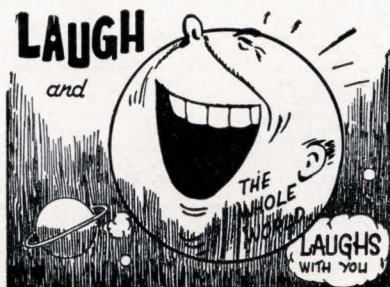
