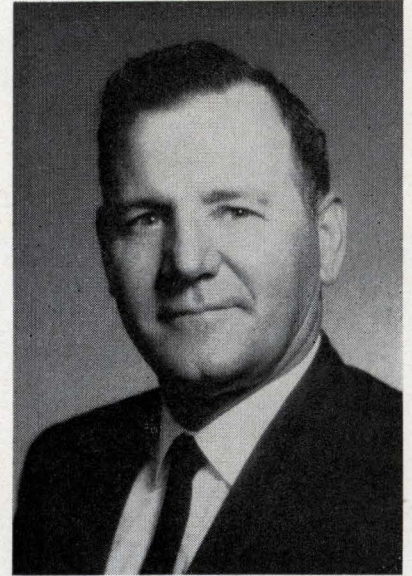

THE FOUR recipients of the Charitable and Educational Foundation's scholarships are mixing work and pleasure this summer before entering college in September. The two sons and two daughters of four Lufkin employees list their college destinations as Texas Woman's University, Angelina College and The University of Texas.

Two of them have specific courses of study planned, ranging from law to nursing, while the other two recent high school graduates will enter as freshmen with undetermined majors. All four scholars are greeting the adjustment and transition from high school to college with enthusiasm.

Jennie Brock is a sophisticated 18-year-old who has had her eye on a nursing degree since she entered her teens.

The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ertis Brock, she was delighted when word came from Texas Woman's University at Denton that living arrangements had been made for her upon acceptance to their nursing program. Since then Jennie has been corresponding with the Arkansas girl who was assigned to her as a roommate, and the two girls are anxious to meet.

In preparation for her future work as a nurse, Jennie has been a Red Cross volunteer at Woodland Heights Hospital for the last two years. Her schooling will include one and a half

years on the T.W.U. campus and two and a half years of hospital experience at one of the two training centers. Jennie has her fingers crossed that she will be assigned to the Houston training center.

The energetic miss is earning the majority of her college expenses this summer by working in the recreation department at Lufkin State School. Classified under a Rehabilitation Service Administration program, her federal grant salary is tax free, saving her more money for university fees. She added that the \$500 per year scholarship will "come in handy with college expenses so high these days."

It looks like Jennie will live up to her title "Most Likely to Succeed" at Huntington High School. Her classmates also voted her Most Popular, Miss HHS, a class officer and Student Council representative. Salutatorian of the 42 Huntington graduates this year, Jennie maintained an A average and was a member of the National Honor Society. She also received the Good Citizen Award from the Daughters of the American Revolution.

On school weekends she was a staunch supporter of her team, entertaining during halftime as a band twirler and yelling from the stands as a member of Pep Squad.

This active girl even stays busy on Sundays by teaching a Sunday School class and serving her church as song leader.

Presently undecided on a major, he plans to take broad, general courses before plotting a career.

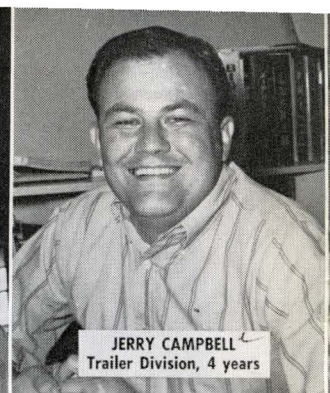
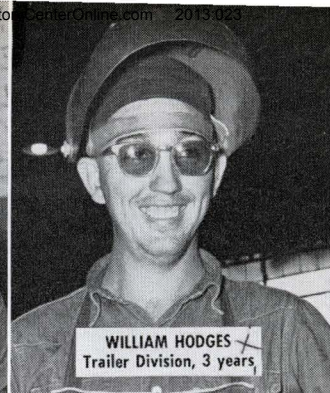
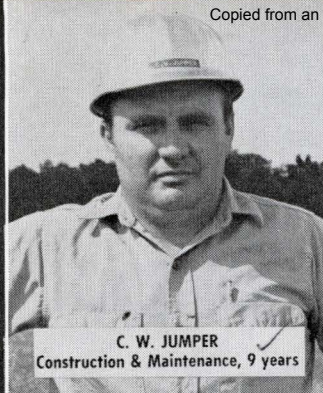

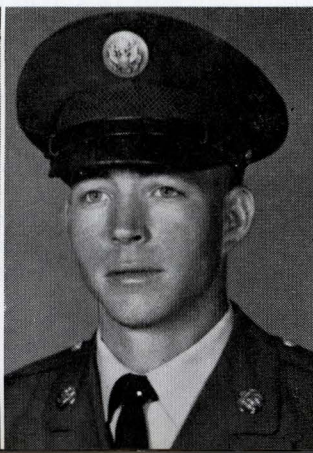

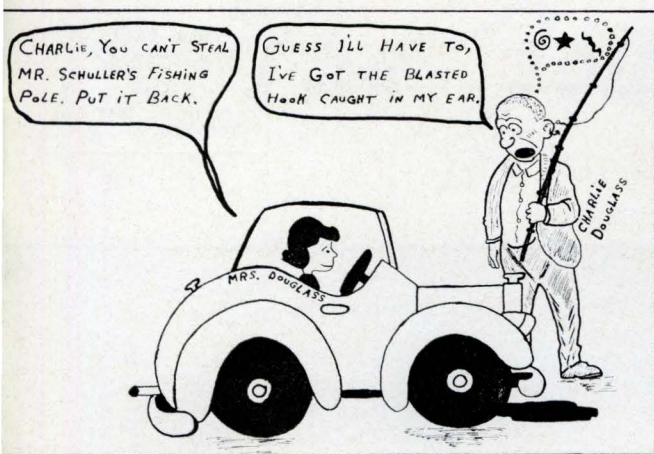
